

To help residents of developing countries enjoy a healthy life, we have expanded the scope of health projects such as improving drinking water hygiene and preventing Non-Communicable diseases. The First Step

In 1988, the Heart to Heart Foundation took its first step to support children and their families who are marginalized and suffering from poverty, disability and disease, and to contribute to improving the quality of life through professional social services.

Establishment

In September 1991, the Heart to Heart Social Welfare Center was opened in Songpa-gu, Seoul, for improvement of community welfare. Systematic welfare projects were carried out to reflect the needs of residents such as children, teenagers, and disabled people for 10 years.

Founded in 1988, the Heart to Heart Foundation is a social welfare and international development cooperation organization that contributes to protecting precious lives and improving the quality of life through health projects such as care, education, and cultural welfare projects at home, and prevention of blindness, drinking water hygiene, and non-infectious diseases abroad.



Established in 1988, the Heart to Heart foundation provides welfare services for children and families at home and abroad who are alienated by poverty, disability, and disease.

In particular, we have developed various welfare, education, culture, and job projects for the rehabilitation and self-reliance of people with developmental disabilities based on our deep interest and mission.

In 2006, the Heart to Heart Orchestra composed of people with developmental disabilities was founded to grow into a cultural welfare model for disabled people, and it was evaluated that it contributed to the spread of cultural welfare for disabled people by actively sharing field experiences and practice cases.

Furthermore, in connection with local governments and companies, we strive to ensure a stable income for disabled artists and create jobs that can continue cultural and artistic activities within the community.

Livelihood Welfare



To help children and their families suffering from poverty, disabilities, and diseases grow into healthy members of society, we discover vulnerable children and teenagers in the community to support medical and living areas.



We supported systematic education in various fields such as software, digital, finance, and eye health so that children and youth, the protagonists of the future generation, can strengthen their capabilities and grow into healthy members of society. In addition to scholarship support and expert mentoring, we held national concerts and Olympiads to share the results, advanced and diversified educational support methods such as online/offline blending, and project-based self-directed learning to bridge the educational gap and foster talent.



Education Environment Improvement Project

Establishment of IT space and cultural art space

We improved creative convergence thinking by supporting the ICT education environment and content. By building a space based on universal design, we supported cultural and artistic activities without restrictions due to disabilities.



Self-reliance support for underprivileged youth

1,010 personnel

For the social advancement of teenagers who have completed protection and youth with unmarried parents, various customized support programs such as vocational competency reinforcement education and self-reliance competency enhancement programs were operated to support social adaptation and economic independence.

We provide opportunities for cultural arts education and cultural activities to culturally marginalized children to develop their talents and improve their social skills.

Nurturing Talent

Nurturing creative and musical talents

We discover creators who cannot receive an education due to disabilities or economic factors and support cultural and artistic creative activities' vitalization through various new media. In addition, we provided opportunities for professional music education and concerts with domestic and foreign professional musicians to children and adolescents from low-income families with musical talents to grow as professional musicians.



Fostering Disability Arts Groups

Great Music Festival

36,625 personnel

The Great Music Festival (GMF), a national music activity support project for disabled people, has discovered music organizations with musical talent and growth potential and has supported sustainable growth. It has produced 1,700 performers over the past six years, becoming the largest music festival for disabled people in Korea. Previous GMF award-winning teams have carried out various performance activities to develop music organizations for the development of disabled people, prejudice against disabilities, efforts to improve awareness and social integration.



Cultural Artistic Activities

Supporting art, sports activities, and more for people with disabilities, etc

6,451 personnel

It provided opportunities for people with developmental disabilities who have limited opportunities for culture and arts education to develop the artistic capabilities of those with developmental disabilities and lay the foundation for self-reliance by supporting cultural and arts education expenses. In addition, in order to solve psychological and emotional problems that emerged after COVID-19, we supported healing programs for children with developmental disabilities and their families to improve interpersonal and self-esteem and reduce parenting stress. We offered support for healing programs designed for children with developmental disabilities and their families, aiming to improve interpersonal relationships, enhance self-esteem, and reduce parental stress.

Self-reliance and Awareness Improvement Projects for disabled People



Develop a project to improve disability awareness centered on people with developmental disabilities to spread understanding and positive awareness of people with developmental disabilities throughout the project and promote the rights of people with disabilities. In addition, it strengthens employment capabilities through customized education support and expert linkage for vulnerable people who are unable to stand on their own feet due to disabilities and economic factors and provides opportunities for self-reliance through job creation.

By providing education on improving awareness of disabled people with developmental disabilities to kindergartners elementary, middle, and high school students, and public institutions, we raised positive awareness of disabled people and expanded opportunities for social participation and self-reliance.

Heart to Heart Orchestra



The Heart to Heart Orchestra's unique education and challenges presents new possibilities for culture and arts for disabled people.

Planning and Executing Musical Events

Support for performance activities and the development of performance contents

64,175 personnel

It presented the possibility of growth of culture and arts for the disabled through the "Heart to Heart Concert" co-hosted by the Seoul Arts Center, the "Master's Series" with top conductors and soloists at home and abroad, the "With Concert" performance with Shinhan Music Award winners, and online performance content planning. In 2022, community-invitation performances were organized to enhance awareness of disabilities. These performances aimed to connect with the global audience through music, featuring visiting concerts at the 20th presidential inauguration ceremony of the Republic of Korea, government agency events, and schools.

Together with three companies (Hyewon Medical Foundation, Samkoo I&C, and S-Oil), we hired performers with developmental disabilities to establish a virtuous cycle model for companies to hire people with disabilities and contribute to society.

The Heart to Heart Orchestra intends to operate more professional and diverse cultural and artistic projects and performances by registering professional arts organizations.

The Miracle of the Heart to Heart Orchestra

Heart to Heart Orchestra is a domestic orchestra for the disabled people for those who mentally struggled founded by the Heart to Heart foundation in 2006. Developmental disability is a severe disability that requires the care and protection of others throughout life, but the disability was not revealed on the outside, so it was alienated, and the most alienated disability, that was the place to reach out. The Heart to Heart foundation decided to form an orchestra by gathering eight elementary and middle school students with developmental disabilities who are interested in music.

However, people tilted their heads when they heard the news of the orchestra's creation. It was an expression of whether that was possible.

The Heart to Heart Orchestra was an experiment and a challenge. Adapting children with developmental disabilities to an orchestra, a small society, was tough. Due to low concentration, the number of children who want to go to the bathroom and are hungry continues to increase whenever they start practicing. I had to say, "I have to listen to other friends' instruments carefully and wait for my turn to play." There were numerous members who couldn't read musical notation, so we had to rehearse a song nearly a thousand times, a task that non-disabled individuals could master in just ten repetitions. The conductor even had to remind them repeatedly to listen attentively to the sounds of other players' instruments and wait for their turn to play.

It took time, but it wasn't in vain. The members changed little by little as they played with their colleagues and leaders in the orchestra. We learned the rules to follow during practice and performance, and listened to other members' performances. The mothers of the orchestra members speak in unison. "The biggest change in the orchestra is sociality. Stuck in their world, children who were always alone learned patience in the orchestra and the meaning of "being together." At some point, the members' skills improved sharply, and the Heart to Heart Orchestra grew as much. Invitations to companies, organizations, and international events increased, and after the performance, the audience gave a standing ovation with loud cheers. Each performance was a moment to prove that people with developmental disabilities, like those without disabilities, have their talents and can be applauded for their talents. It is said that the audience listened to the Heart to Heart orchestra's performance not with their head but with their heart and that they have the power to resonate in their heart. Music played with the heart and listened with the heart, connecting the mind and heart, changing the perception that people looked at people with developmental disabilities positively.

The Heart to Heart orchestra performed not only in Korea but also in the world's most prestigious venues, such as Carnegie Hall in New York and the John F. Kennedy Center. Also, the Heart to Heart orchestra continued to perform in Japan, Canada, and China. Since its foundation in 2006, it has performed 1,500 times at home and abroad.

The main reason for the award was the positive impact of the Heart to Heart orchestra, which consists of people with developmental disabilities, on our society as a leading example of cultural welfare. We walked down a road no one had ever taken, and 16 years had passed while walking on that road. We weren't alone. When we held each other's hands, a beautiful melody was created. Because of that, I could walk for many years without stopping. The road is not over yet. In the distance, "Still the Way to Go" gently beckons toward the Heart to Heart orchestra.

Water, Hygiene and Sanitation



We provided safe and clean water and hygienic toilets to developing countries and contribute to ensuring residents' fundamental and health rights by conducting activities to prevent and treat water-borne diseases.

[Tanzania] Drinking Water Facility Support

We built drinking water facilities in a total of 5 villages in Lindi City (municipal), Tanzania, and formed a village drinking water committee. Through this, facility maintenance education has been provided to increase safe access to drinking water for residents, and they became possible to maintain and manage drinking water facilities by themselves.



[Malawi] Improvement of drinking water sanitation

We installed drinking water facilities in 14 villages for Machinga, District, Malawi residents and we organized a water facility management committee to provide maintenance and repair training for the sustainable use of drinking water facilities. In addition, to improve residents' hygiene awareness, a community-based integrated sanitation program activation process was conducted in 75 villages, and a total of 55 villages achieved ODF (Often Defecation Free) certification. In relation to the prevention and response to major waterborne diseases, we provided medicines and medical consumables to 22 public health centers in Machinga District and conducted training on strengthening waterborne diseases management capabilities for 88 medical personnel.



Eye Health



We provided opportunities for vision recovery and blindness prevention to the people in underdeveloped countries. Moreover, we support the improvement of fundamental ophthalmology medical services through multilateral capacity building and foundation establishment.

[Cambodia] School-Based Eye Health Promotion

We provided eye disease and vision test education to public school teachers in Siem Reap, Cambodia, and supported eye tests for students based on the school. Also, we contributed to the improvement of student's eye health by supporting secondary precision eye examinations, eye care, and spectacle treatment through nurses at the Vision Center of the Government Hospital. Meanwhile, as a technical commissioner in the field of eye health officially appointed by the Cambodian Ministry of Health, we are actively participating in policy forums and seminars to implement and develop the national eye health plans.



[Bangladesh] Strengthen Eye Disease Prevention and Treatment Capacity

We operate vision centers in Sabah and Damrai, Bangladesh. Opportunities for eye examinations for local residents were improved by conducting outreach to local communities, elementary schools, and ophthalmologists, and patients in need of transfers were transferred to Bangladesh - Korea Friendship Hospital (BKFH) for treatment and surgery. In addition, we supported establishing a sustainable eye health system by participating in the INGO meeting, an eye health consultative body meeting in Bangladesh, and the development of the Bangladesh Eye Health Plan (NEC).



[Tanzania] Primary School-Based Eye Health Promotion

We conducted an eye health improvement project for 75 elementary schools in Mtama District, Tanzania. We trained elementary school teachers to conduct vision tests and eye health education, and for students selected for the first checkup, eye health specialists visited the school to conduct detailed checkups and treatment. Since then, we have contributed to the early detection of eye diseases and the prevention of blindness by supporting spectacles, surgery services, and post-monitoring services according to the conditions and needs of children.

Non-Communicable Diseases Prevention and Control

We provided non-communicable disease management service within the primary health system based on Cambodia's National Strategic Plan for the Prevention and Control of Noncommunicable Diseases. Moreover, we contributed on strengthening community-based disease prevention response capabilities and health equity and efficiency.

[Cambodia] Prevention and Control of Diabetes and Hypertension Project

We provided training of Non-Communicable Diseases prevention and control to governmental health personnel and teachers in Battambang, Cambodia, and established three NCD specialized HC (Health clinic) to help local residents prevent and manage hypertension and diabetes regularly. In addition, we promoted awareness of prevention of non-communicable diseases through 'World No Tobacco Day' and 'World Diabetes Day' campaigns targeting students and local residents.

We opened an English education and culture center in Fergana, Uzbekistan, provided educational equipment and programs, and contributed to increasing employment and opportunities to go to university by supporting foreign language education for young people from the underprivileged in the region.



[Philippines] Scholarship Support for Underprivileged Youth

We provided scholarships to children and teenagers from the underprivileged in the Philippines to secure opportunities for higher education and receive a quality education so that they could pursue their dreams.

[Amazon] Support for Youth Education in the Amazon Region

We supported the operation of a 'Friend's House' dormitory and study room for underprivileged children and teenagers in the Amazon region of Recitilla, located in the southernmost region of Colombia. Through this, we contributed to nurturing the next generation in the Amazon region by providing various classes such as music, art, language (English, Portuguese, Korean), culture, and sports, as well as maintaining stable food, clothing and shelter for children and teenagers in slums in the Amazon.



[Amazon] Support for the Construction of a Bakery in the Amazon Region

By supporting the reconstruction of the only bakery in an Indian village along the Amazon River, bread, the staple food of residents, was smoothly supplied to the village of Santa Rosa and 28 surrounding villages, contributing to the creation of jobs in the local community.

Special Book Production and Campaign

Only 16% of the 150,000 books owned by the National Library for the Disabled are for blind people, and only 37% are for blind people in schools nationwide. Books for the visually impaired are difficult to produce because the production cost and production time are four times that of ordinary books.

The Heart to Heart Foundation has been conducting a special book production and support campaign consisting of tactile, braille, voice, and large letters since 2016 so that visually impaired children who are vulnerable to information can easily access information.
